SUMMARY

Mayor Garcetti is taking unprecedented steps to increase tree canopy across Los Angeles by 2028, including by at least 50% in areas of greatest need. Urban forests bring cooler temperatures, help clean our air, and make our communities more beautiful. We are working hard to expand tree canopy in our hottest and most underserved neighborhoods so that all Angelenos can experience the power of trees.

BENEFITS

- Lowers temperatures by 8-10 degrees, reducing heat-related illnesses.
- Improves air quality by removing harmful pollutants -- each tree removes 48lbs of CO2 annually, equivalent to taking 10 cars off the road for a year.
- Encourages walking and bicycling by creating shady public spaces.
- Cools homes and buildings and limits the need for air conditioning.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR ACTION:

Request a free street tree from City Plants

City Plants will obtain the necessary permits from the City's Urban Forestry Division, which includes identifying the most appropriate species for your home or neighborhood and the best location(s) for planting. One of their planting partners will then come plant the tree for you. You will be responsible for watering your tree.
